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Purpose:

Ohio Law requires school districts to develop a plan for using the SWSF / DPIA funds. In collaboration with both community and school personnel who address the physical and mental health needs of our students. 50% or more of the SWSF are dedicated to services that address these needs. Service Areas- 2024

Service Area	Fund	Service Description	Projected Allocation
Physical Health Services	SWSF	Occupational therapists provide support with sensory /fine motor assessments and development activities such as autistic students who need sensory friendly environments or therapy to develop muscles for handwriting. Physical therapists also assess and assist in planning for gross motor skills, ambulatory skills, and modifications for classroom expectations and lessons.	\$524,075
Mental Health Services	SWSF	School Counselors provide support to students in distress, assist with classroom behavioral accommodations, and with building-wide PBIS planning, implementation and progress monitoring.	\$562,485
Physical Health Services	SWSF	School Nurses support the needs of staff and students for physical health issues such as but not limited to minor accidents, medicinal schedules, student health plans, and any needs related to physical health. They also assist in the planning for wellness activities and practices across the district.	\$60,674
School Safety	DPIA	School Resource Officers support safety and security issues within the district, are present during the day and school events to assist with unruly situations, safety concerns and planning for safety issues such as an active shooter or campus emergency. They serve and protect.	\$251,302
Reading Improvement and Intervention	DPIA	Reading intervention periods are embedded within daily schedules so students are assured to have individual academic needs met. Example: Tier 2 or 3 interventions can be provided to at risk students in a consistent manner.	\$366,836
